School days are here again

THERE were a few sad eyes yesterday as a number of private schools along the Coast returned from eight weeks' holiday while State school students fill in another week.

Students at Geneva Baptist School, Latrobe, Penguin Adventist School and Stella Maris in Burnie returned from holidays yesterday as did another 14,000 students around the State.

State primary and high school students and remaining Catholic schools on the Coast will return on Tuesday.

Year 11 and 12 students from Marist Regional College and St Brendan-Shaw College spent the last two days in orientation classes with grade seven classes beginning similar exercises today.

The principal of St Brendan-Shaw College, Sr Josephine Brady, said yesterday that students would receive a

three-week break in said yesterday 90 students had enrolled taking the school total to about 350.

Although only in its second year with higher school certificate courses Sr Josephine

with more than 360 students attending Sacred Heart (Ulverstone) and a further 300 at St Patrick's and 420 at Our Lady of Lourdes (Devonport).
